Sermon The Mystery of Light

In Epiphany we declare Jesus to be the light of the world. Light is the milieu that surrounds and suffuses our lives, so it is easy to take it for granted. But there are those who have never taken it for granted. For artists, when the light is just right, a fence post becomes a sacrament of the holy. When sailors are lost at sea, they look for the beacon of the lighthouse to guide them to safety.

Scientists certainly don't take light for granted. The universe began as an explosion of light and heat that expanded out in all directions. Physicist David Bohm called matter "frozen light" — light that vibrates slowly enough to assume form. It turns out that out entire planet is reconstituted sunlight: certain cells learned to "eat" the sun through photosynthesis; animals then eat the plants, and humans eat the animals and plants. Everything we see around us, including our own lives, is a transformation of the sun's light, which pours out four million tonnes of hydrogen every second in the service of life.

No small wonder that Jesus came to be associated with light, the source of all life, the radiance that reveals the inner beauty of even the most mundane objects, the one who lights our path to the heart of God when we are lost, and the one who pours himself out completely and in awesome abundance in the service of the spiritual evolution of the universe.

In the human realm, light is often associated with conscious awareness. When we shine the light of consciousness upon previously unconscious thoughts, beliefs, and worldviews, we experience a kind of spiritual freedom. What was subjectively hidden to us becomes objectively obvious.

Through the light of conscious awareness, we are able to see what had been shrouded in darkness, and therefore had power over the choices and the kind of life we could create. As teacher of divine truths, Jesus shone the light of his consciousness onto the realm of the kin(g)dom of God, an interior, relational, and social realm. By bringing to bear his enlightened consciousness, he revealed dimensions of reality that were always present but not seen by those who dwelled in the darkness of unconsciousness.

After years of contemplative and meditative practice, mystics describe experiencing uncreated light, the luminous presence of the sacred before the realm of space and time—of suns and planets—came into be- ing. All light in the realm of creation is borrowed light. The Christian tradition claims that Jesus, the Christ, shone with this uncreated light.

Holy, holy, our hearts adore you. our hearts are glad to say these words: *You are holy, God.*

Presider: At his final meal with his disciples, Jesus broke bread and helped them to understand that he had given himself as bread for a hungry world: "This is my body, broken for you." When the meal was finished, he helped them to understand that he had poured himself out completely for the emergence of a new humanity: "This is my blood, poured our for you."

Holy One, May your ever-present spirit bless these gifts and bless this gathering, that we may be transformed by his radiance and become, by a grace beyond our understanding, the light that shines, first upon those places within ourselves that are born of fear, and then those dark places and ways of being in the world that are the children of

To you, whose light and love "fires the sun" and keeps us burning,²⁸ we dedicate this banquet of love.
