Sermon: Birth Pangs: A Path towards Wholeness

No one ever said it was going to be easy to follow Jesus and become a proclaimer and a practitioner of the Realm of God--God's Malkutah. Malkutah is the Aramaic word that Jesus used to speak about the realm of God within which he acted and which he proclaimed—a realm of abundance and peace and justice where all belong. It is the word I prefer to use because it has layers of meaning that have no relation to the concepts of hierarchy and power over others that are implied by the more conventional phrase "kingdom of God."

To follow Jesus is to be at home and empowered within the presence of God and Malkutah wherever we might find ourselves—a realm where we can become fully human like him—fully connected with the original soil and unconditional love that is our beginning and our birthright..

When we step onto this path of unconditional love and life in God with Jesus we are promised rich abundance of life but it is not something of which we can be in control nor is it without pain. It is a path we can trust and it is a path on which we will never be alone, but it may lead through what seems like absolute chaos. It is a path we can trust but it may sometimes feel like it is leading us away from where we think we should be going. This is why walking a winding circular path called a labyrinth has become a spiritual practice that many people find helpful in these crazy out-of-control times that we are living in. Labyrinths—an ancient pre-Christian symbol—are found all over the world. It was embraced and developed in medieval times as a way that people could make a symbolic spiritual pilgrimage to Jerusalem even though they couldn't afford to do it in reality. There is a famous labyrinth on the floor of Chartres Cathedral in France.

A labyrinth is not a maze where you encounter obstacles and dead ends and get lost. A labyrinth is a single path that winds back and forth and around. Sometimes it passes very close to the centre and at other times it takes you far away from the centre but if you trust it and keep on walking it will take you right into the centre and then, back out again.

In our text today the Apostle Paul talks about birth pangs—the difficult, painful labour of childbirth which is another image for a path that must be followed and trusted despite its difficulties. We are urged to persist, trusting the birthpangs along this path because we will emerge into the wholeness and the ressurection life of Malkutah—a realm of true community where all are welcome and all are at home.

Many of you will remember a moment In January of 2016 Valerie Kaur, a Sikh activist and lawyer, spoke at an interfaith "watchnight" service that was orga-

nized to respond to a series of hate crimes in the United States. Her core image speaks directly to our situation today. She said: "What if this darkness is not the darkness of the tomb, but the darkness of the womb? What if our America is not dead but a country that is waiting to be born? What if the story of America is one long labor? What if all of our grandfathers and grandmothers are standing behind us now, those who survived occupation and genocide, slavery and Jim Crow, detentions and political assault? What if they are whispering in our ears 'You are brave!' What if this is our nation's greatest transition? What does the midwife tell us to do? Breathe. And then? Push. Because if we don't push we will die. If we don't push our nation will die. Tonight we will breathe. Tomorrow we will labor in love..."

And where in God in all of this? God is like a midwife at our side—God with Us—and, come what may, she's not going anywhere; God the midwife is right here coaxing and soothing us, challenging us to stay on the path and push through the pain in order to receive the new life that is being born. God, the midwife, is holding us, the world, and all its people in her strong, capable hands, groaning with us as we hurt and grieve and fear, steadfastly urging us to choose life instead of death, gentleness instead of violence, justice instead of greed, hope instead of despair. God, the midwife, pushes us to change our lives in ways that will allow new life to be born in the world. God, the midwife speaks words of encouragement, reminding us of how strong we are, how beautiful, how beloved, how important.

Having faith in a loving, steadfast, ever-present, midwife God doesn't mean that we will get the outcome we desire; it doesn't mean we won't fear or doubt or be anxious or suffer. But it does allow us to bring all of those things into the larger vision of God's future. And when we do that, our suffering is given some meaning, our hopes are given content and shape, and we are reminded of who we are and what we can do: namely, we are children of God who are entrusted with giving birth to God's love in our own lives, in our communities, in our world. No matter how long the birth pangs last. May God grant us grace to endure the pain so that we can experience the joy. Amen.
